Mission Statement & Philosophy

Beautiful Savior Lutheran School is a Lutheran Elementary school and operated by Beautiful Savior Evangelical Lutheran Church in Grove City, Ohio, a member of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod (WELS). Our mission statement is:

Beautiful Savior Lutheran School is a preschool through eighth grade school, which provides a Christ-centered, Bible-based education where children of our congregation and community have the opportunity to grow spiritually, intellectually, emotionally, socially, and physically.

Our Church considers each child to be a precious gift from God. In the Bible, God assigns parents the responsibility for the development of the child spiritually, emotionally, mentally, socially, and physically. To help parents carry out such awesome responsibilities, our church has undertaken the cost of conducting a school.

The most significant task a parent faces is to provide for the spiritual development of their children. The Bible tells us that all children born into this world have an immortal soul and need to be prepared for eternity. Preparing the child for eternity means leading them to recognize themselves as sinners and to confess Jesus Christ as their Savior.

This preparation for eternity provides, in the highest degree, the foundation for development of their children. The Bible states: “The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge” Proverbs 1:7.

Our basic view is that our school is an extension of the home. The school assists in fostering the development of the child in all the areas previously listed. Consequently, one of the primary goals of the school is to supplement the Bible-based training received at home with a Christ-centered, elementary education. You can be confident that every day your child will receive spiritual and moral training based on the Holy

Bible. Furthermore, all courses will be taught in harmony with the teaching of the Bible.

We consider it a privilege to conduct our school so the children may grow in Christian faith, develop their God-given talents, be trained in leading a God-pleasing life, and receive eternal life.

As we seek to develop the talents of the children, we want them to learn faithfulness, develop a sense of responsibility, and learn the skills and concepts that are the basis for a productive and happy life. We also intend to develop the highest class of citizenship in which the child is taught to be truly concerned about other people.

Purpose of Handbook

The main purpose of this handbook is to provide parents with a source of information on matters pertaining to the overall program of Beautiful Savior Lutheran School. You are urged to read the contents of this booklet and to keep it available throughout the year. By being well informed, the home, church, and school will better provide the maximum benefits of Christian education for one of the Lord's most valuable blessing, children.

Authority and Control

The responsibility for the day-to-day management of the school is delegated by the School Board to the school principal. The school principal is responsible and accountable to the School Board. All teachers and staff shall be responsible and accountable to the school principal.

The School Objectives

There are seven basic objectives of Beautiful Savior Lutheran School.

1. Spiritual - To increase the child's knowledge of the Bible, with the help of the Holy Spirit, to lead children to believe in Jesus Christ as their Savior, and to nurture an attitude of loving service to our gracious Lord and to others.

2. Mental - To lead the child to recognize reason as a gift from God, to learn skills, and habits of thinking logically, scientifically, and creatively; and to help the child build and use common skills and fundamental tools of knowledge and communication so that children may excel in academic studies.

3. Social – To provide the child with opportunities to learn to function effectively at home, in church, and in society; to provide Christian fellowship and kindness; and to develop an awareness of the needs of others.

4. Emotional – To help the child understand the only source of security is faith in the redemptive work of Jesus Christ. This security builds a sense of Christian worth in the child and helps in relationships with others.

5. Aesthetic – To help the child appreciate the beauty of God's creation, to foster an appreciation for the fine arts, and to help the child develop and use any God-given talents to the best of his ability.

6. Physical – To help each child develop a knowledge of and respect for their body, and to encourage responsibility in matters of health, safety, and recreation.

7. Christian Living – The Psalmist said, "I rejoiced with those who said to me, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord'" Psalm 122:1. We share that attitude and expect that if you choose to send your child, you also share this attitude. Therefore, it is an objective of the school to encourage the child to attend church each Sunday, to participate in the mission offering as training in stewardship and to be devout and attentive in the chapel services we hold in the school. We expect that parents will be good role models in these matters and we will address the parents with any concerns.

The Multi-Grade Classroom

Beautiful Savior Lutheran School is currently designed with Preschool, Kindergarten, and grades one through eight. Preschool has its own separate classroom. Grades kindergarten through eight are conducted in “multi-grade” classroom environments. We feel this situation is beneficial for most children, but certainly not for all.

There are several benefits to a multi-grade classroom. In this environment, children hear, or are exposed to, curriculum that can be several grades ahead of their current grade. This occurs when upper grade classes are held and material is covered. The child may not be participating in the class, but they do hear what is being taught. As they return each year, this curriculum is repeated again. Continued exposure to curricular material over several years will aid in the retention and comprehension of that material.

The Courses in our School

There are eight (8) major areas of instruction in our school.

RELIGION – Chapel, devotions, confirmation class, Bible history, hymnology, and catechism

SOCIAL STUDIES – Geography, history, Ohio history.

MATHEMATICS – Elementary math and Pre-Algebra.

MUSIC – Listening, theory, and rhythm.

SCIENCE – Earth, life, physical, and health.

LANGUAGE ARTS – Reading, spelling, literature, penmanship, phonics, and speech.

ARTS – Art History and skill development.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION – Calisthenics, skills and introduction to sports.

Enrollment Policies

Our school operates on principles and teachings (doctrine) drawn from God’s Word and in agreement with the Lutheran Confession, which we hold to as a true exposition of God’s Word. Our school, therefore, teaches what is confessed and believed in our church and church body, the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod, or WELS.

By enrolling their children at our school, parents indicate their willingness to have their children instructed by these principles and teachings. The classroom will not be the place for students to promote teachings or beliefs that conflict with our confession of faith. The Bible Information Class (BIC)*, taught by the pastor, is an ideal place for parents to discuss God’s Word and what will be taught. Well informed parents are better prepared to make a proper decision regarding the religious instruction of their children.

Beautiful Savior Lutheran School will admit all qualified students without regard to race, color, ethnic background or national origin. All rights and privileges will be accorded impartially to all students. Also, all programs will be available to all students.

Applications for enrollment will be divided into four categories and will be processed in the following order.

1. Children whose parents are members of Beautiful Savior Evangelical Lutheran Church.
2. Children whose parents are members of another Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod congregation, or a member of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod.
3. Children whose parents have expressed an interest in joining our church. (Please see notes #1 and #2 on following page).

*These classes are offered regularly throughout the school year.

4. Children whose parents have a sincere interest in providing a Christian education, but, who prefer to keep their present church status. (Please see notes #2 and #3).

Note #1: Our pastor conducts a Bible Information Course (BIC) on a regular basis for those who wish to become members of Beautiful Savior Evangelical Lutheran Church. The purpose of the BIC is to acquaint the parents with the teachings of our church. If the parents choose not to join our church, future enrollment will be considered in category #4.

Note #2: All students enrolled in our school will be required to participate in the full course of religious instruction and participate in school/church activities such as children's choir, Christmas service, and other activities as announced. You cannot claim exemption for the child from these activities.

Note #3: Our school is operated on the basis of the teachings of God's Word.

In January, applications will be distributed to the parents of all children in the congregation who have reached elementary school age. Non-member parents may obtain applications beginning February 15th. Notification regarding non-member acceptance will be made as soon as possible.

Age requirements – Prospective Kindergarten students must be at least five (5) years of age by September 30th of the school year entered. Children entering the First grade must be at least six (6) years old by September 30th and have successfully completed an approved Kindergarten program.

When a student enrolls in grades 1-8, we will help the student adjust to the new classroom setting. This may mean some catching up, if necessary. We will have regular consultations with the parents to evaluate the progress of the student.

Our school is not equipped to provide separate staff to teach children with special needs. If

parents choose to enroll their children with special needs to our school, we will try to seek assistance from the South-Western City School District.

The Teacher's Responsibility to the Parents

Report cards are issued every quarter. Parent-teacher conferences are scheduled after the first and third grading periods to discuss the child's progress. Appointments for other conferences may be requested by the parent, or by the teacher, at any time during the school year.

If there is a possibility that a child will be retained in a grade, the teacher is required to have a consultation with the parents. After this meeting, the situation is to be reviewed by the principal and teacher. If the recommendation of the principal and teacher is for retention, they make the recommendation to the School Board. The School Board will be responsible for final action in the matter.

Achievement Testing

We participate in standardized tests (Terra Nova) for grades 3-8 each fall. The results of these tests help the teachers evaluate the strengths and weaknesses of each student. The tests also give the teachers a chance to compare the scholastic performance of our school with other WELS schools and national averages.

Code of Conduct

"...Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." John 13:3

We expect and encourage the following Christian attitudes in our students for a Christ-centered atmosphere in our school:

- Giving their Savior and His Word top priority in their lives.
- Showing honor, love and respect for parents/guardians and Beautiful Savior Lutheran School authorities that the Lord has placed over them at home, church, and school, including extra-curricular activities.
- Showing Christian love and consideration for their classmates in school and their fellow human beings outside of school.

Discipline Policy

The goal is for students to reflect the love that the Lord has showered on us. Christian discipline is a result of God's love for us and follows in response to the forgiveness that is found in Jesus Christ. God loved us enough to send His Son to die for us. We strive to do God's will as a reflection of God's love and as a "thank you" to God in appreciation for what He has done. Students are taught to think and consider other people. This truly represents the gospel made manifest in that students learn to constantly put the needs of others before their own short term wants and desires.

Discipline when carried out properly is meant to teach a child how to make God-pleasing decisions.

1. Parental authority is extended to teachers and staff when students are in school.
2. Out of love for the Lord and for the students, discipline is implemented in a loving and consistent manner in our partnership with parents.
3. The behavioral standard at Beautiful Savior Lutheran School is based on God's Word. Our goal is for students to be pro-active in showing self-discipline based on God's love for us through Jesus Christ.

At times, students demonstrate behavior which is outside of the pro-active, gospel-motivated framework outlined above. During these unfortunate moments it becomes necessary to utilize the Law as a tool to show students that their actions are inappropriate and unacceptable. In such situations, we work hard to avoid negatively charged teacher-to-student interactions. We instead believe in constantly and calmly emphasizing choices and consequences. Such an approach helps the student to maintain a focus on the specific behavior which was problematic rather than personalizing the disciplinary situation to the adult who is delivering the consequence.

When students fail to make positive choices, the teacher reserves the right to determine necessary consequences to achieve appropriate changes in student behavior. That said, the following are examples of specific consequences typically utilized at Beautiful Savior:

1. Students sit or stand in an isolated location to think about behavior.
2. Students write documents focused on behavioral improvement.
3. Students work to complete community or school service projects.

At times, when a student's behavior is particularly disruptive or disrespectful, it becomes necessary to remove students from the academic environment. Such removal is based upon our belief that behavioral and moral development is of

primary importance and ultimately crucial for student growth and behavioral improvement. Therefore, we firmly believe in utilizing after-school detention. (Full day out-of-school suspensions are reserved for particular disruptive behaviors and typically an indication that student is nearing expulsion from the school program.) Behaviors which may lead to an after-school detention include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Saying “No” to any staff member when asked to do something which is not illegal or immoral
2. Non-verbal defiance
3. Actions displaying blatant disrespect (rolling of eyes, huffing, etc.)
4. Verbally abusing other students or tearing other students down
5. Repeated minor infractions accompanied by a refusal to repent
6. Intentional academic dishonesty
7. Behaviors disrupting instruction (displays of anger, screaming, etc.)

In instances of extreme negative behaviors such as physical abuse, property damage, theft, gang-related activity or the possession of any illegal narcotic or weapon; an immediate out-of-school suspension or expulsion may occur.

Personal Electronic Device Policy: As our need for communication increases, more and more students are showing up at school with cell phones and other personal electronic devices. While the need for cell phones, ipods, etc. is understood, certain procedures need to be followed so that these devices will be used in a God-pleasing manner.

1. Students will not be permitted to send or receive calls, texts, or emails in the classroom.
2. Students may make phone calls or check email and text messages at the beginning of recess periods with prior permission of a teacher.
3. Devices with classroom applications (Bible software, calculators, organizers, etc.) can be used only at the discretion of the classroom teacher.

Failure to follow this procedure can result in confiscation of the device and consultation with parents. If the device is confiscated, it must be claimed in person by a parent.

Internet: Students can utilize the Internet to access unique educational resources and have opportunities for collaborative work. Prior to accessing the Internet, students may be required to receive training in its proper educational uses. Students not abiding by the provisions of this policy may have their Internet access privileges removed for part or all of the school year. Beautiful Savior Lutheran School is making Internet access available to further educational goals and objectives; we believe that the benefits of accessing information resources and opportunities for collaboration exceed the disadvantages. Teachers and administrators will guide students toward tracking down appropriate material.

Students are expected to *avoid certain types of websites*. These include, but are not limited to, the following: listening to music, playing games, and joining in any type of chat rooms. E-mail, Internet, and/or network privileges may be suspended/revised for poor performance in classes. If a student is found to be visiting inappropriate sites intentionally, disciplinary actions will be taken.

Detentions: An after-school detention will last one hour.

Suspensions: A student assigned to a full day out-of-school suspension may not be on school grounds during the school day hours (8:15 am – 3:15 pm). If a student receives two out-of-school suspensions during a school year, parents and students will meet with the school principal to enter into a contractual agreement concerning the terms of their ability to remain at the school. Breaking this contract will result in immediate expulsion.

Students assigned a detention or a suspension are not permitted to participate in extra-curricular school activities during that day.

School Hours

Students are urged to be in school between 8:00 am and 8:10 am so they are at their desks when school starts at 8:15 am. School is dismissed at 3:15 pm and the children need to be picked up at this time, unless other arrangements are made in advance with the teacher.

Tardy Policy

Tardiness is a form of absence. Our school begins promptly at 8:15am. A tardy child loses learning time and also, by disruption, causes other students to lose learning time. Therefore, children not at their desks by 8:15 am will be marked tardy. If repeated tardiness occurs in the same quarter, the following policy will be observed:

After 5 tardies - The classroom teacher will contact the parents and attempt to arrive at a solution.

After 10 tardies - The school principal will meet with the parents to discuss the situation.

After 15 tardies - The issue will be brought to the School Board, at which time the child may be suspended.

The School Board reserves the right to consider each case individually.

Absence Policy

Prompt, regular school attendance is expected of each and every child. Without this, learning gaps can seriously affect the progress of your child. Please do your best to keep absences to a minimum.

Children who are absent must bring a written excuse from their parents the day they return to school. Absences due to illness or death in the family are considered valid excuses. We urge you to check the calendar and try to schedule routine medical appointments on days when there is no school. If you must miss school for a medical

appointment, please have the student return to school afterwards.

Beautiful Savior Lutheran School strongly encourages families to schedule vacations around the school calendar. If a family decides to take a vacation during the school year, notify the principal and your child's teacher ahead of time so that the teacher will have missed work ready upon the student's return. It is not the teacher's responsibility to instruct students on work missed.

In the unfortunate event that a student's absences become excessive, the following absence schedule will be used:

After 7 days per semester (14 per year) - The classroom teacher will contact the parents to inform them of the number of absences.

After 10 days per semester (20 per year) - This will result in a mandatory parent conference with the school principal to discuss the situation.

After 12 days per semester (24 per year) - This may result in the student failing the class.

The School Board reserves the right to consider each case individually.

1/2 Day Absences

It may at times be necessary for a student to miss part, rather than a full day, of school. A ½ day absence will be recorded if a student arrives after 10:30 am or leaves school prior to 1:30 pm.

Special Activity Absences

Some concern has been raised in the past regarding attendance at special activities such as field trips, track meets, etc. In such cases the following policy will be observed: If the activity is scheduled on the school calendar and it occurs on what would normally be a school day (i.e. Monday- Friday), students are expected to attend and absences will be recorded. If homework is issued to the students in attendance at the activity (as in the case of the upper-grade spring field

trip), then the same homework will be issued to any student marked absent. If no homework is given to students in attendance, then no assignments will be given to any absent students.

Homework

Students who attend our school will be completing some of their assignments at home. Parents have a vital responsibility to provide a suitable environment for the child to study. Parents will also have to practice good time-management so the child has time to complete these assignments. A parent can be a very special blessing to their children by encouraging the child to develop good, consistent study habits.

Late Work Policy

Homework will be regularly assigned in most classes. In many cases, students will have time to finish the work during school. The teacher will inform students of when the homework is to be completed. Except for illness, any homework not completed and handed in by the due date will be considered late. In each case, a note will be sent home informing the parents of the late work and the following scale will be used per quarter:

- 1st Offense - 10 % grade reduction on each late assignment
- 2nd Offense - 10 % grade reduction on each late assignment; Academic log entry made in PowerSchool
- 3rd Offense - 10 % grade reduction on each late assignment; Teacher meets with parents to discuss situation.
- 4th Offense - Work receives automatic “F”; student is suspended from next extra-curricular activity. (Grades 5-8)

All late work must be completed on the day in which it is incurred. Failure to do so will result in an automatic 1 hour after school detention. (If a student is involved in an after school event such as

sports, the student will forfeit participation in that day’s event.)

Conflict Resolution

Since, with the teachers, parents share the goal of helping the child grow and mature, it is assumed that both parents and teachers will work in harmony. We have the confidence that our teachers will make every effort to treat all children fairly in accordance with God’s Word. We also have the confidence that parents will teach their children to respect their teachers according to the Fourth Commandment. At the same time, we realize that each child does have a sinful nature. The harmony between the parents and teachers can prove to be a blessing to the child if the parents and teachers work to solve problems.

To guide Christians when disagreements and problems occur, our Savior has given us two guidelines to use;

Explain things in the best possible way, and

Talk to the person first. (Matthew 18:15-17)

Gossipy criticism helps no one. It would seem reasonable that a parent who wishes to discuss a problem with a teacher would do so away from the students and outside of the school day. Here is a simple process to help with disagreements.

When a problem arises, go to the person with whom there is a concern. Discuss it with them in a respectful manner.

If there is no resolution, and this is a teacher, ask to speak to the principal.

If there is no resolution with the principal, request to speak to one of the School Board members. The Pastor is an “ex-officio” member of the School Board and is responsible for the entire ministry of Beautiful Savior Evangelical Lutheran Church.

The Registration Process

During July, announcements will be made about the date and times of registration. Beautiful Savior Lutheran School is funded through the operating budget of our church. Tuition is charged to all students at Beautiful Savior Lutheran School. Tuition partly covers the day to day operation of the school and also covers the cost of religious books, workbooks, textbooks, art and classroom supplies. Member tuition is at a reduced rate as compared to non-member tuition. Please refer to the separate sheet of paper with the current tuition prices.

Failure to pay tuition in a timely manner will be reported to the School Board. Once a delinquency occurs, unless satisfactory arrangements are made with the school, the affected student may be suspended.

The tuition schedule is as follows:

- One ninth of the tuition is due on or prior to first day of school
- One ninth of the tuition is due on the first day of each month (October to May)

You can also take advantage of a 10% “pre-payment” discount if the full tuition is paid prior to the first day of school.

Multiple child discount- We give a discount to families with multiple children being enrolled in our school. The first child is full price, the second child is 30% off their tuition costs, the third child is 35% off their tuition costs, and the discount increases by 5% for each child.

There are two additional fees: a fee for Insufficient Funds (returned) checks and a fee for receiving late tuition payments.

The Insufficient Fund fee is whatever the bank charges the school. The amount will be added to the next invoice.

A late fee of \$10 is assessed when a payment is more than 5 business days late. This fee will be added to the next invoice sent to the parent’s address.

Other Records - We must emphasize that all records, medical recommendations and evaluations must be given to our staff before enrollment. All students enrolling in any Ohio school for the first time are to have the proper immunizations and a copy of the child’s medical examination by the time of enrollment. A record of your child’s immunizations and medical examination must be turned into the school before the child can be registered. (Parents may sign a vaccine refusal form per Ohio Statute 3313.671 (exemptions) in replace of the immunization form.)

Health/Wellness

Health – In cases of injury or accident, the teacher will treat minor injuries (small cuts and scrapes) by washing and applying a bandage. In cases of more serious illness or injury, the teacher will determine whether the situation is an emergency. If it is an emergency, the teacher will contact Jackson Township Emergency Squad first and then the parents will be notified as soon as possible. Parents may check with the school to determine how the school’s insurance policy supplements your health coverage.

If there is no apparent immediate emergency, the teacher will keep the child at school and contact the parents for a decision of what to do next in the best interest of the child. From the emergency medical forms, we also have the name of the family doctor and dentist and will use this information, if appropriate.

In the rare event of head lice, once it is brought to the attention of the staff, all students will be checked within that classroom and a note will be coming home with your child explaining treatment. The affected child will be sent home.

Sickness

Students displaying any of the following symptoms are not permitted to attend school:

- A temperature of 100 degrees or more (or one to two degrees above the child's normal temperature with or without symptoms)
- Undiagnosed rash with other symptoms (i.e. fever, cough, sore throat, etc.)
- Vomiting or diarrhea
- Known communicable diseases (including lice, conjunctivitis (pinkeye), strep throat, measles, mumps, or any contagious illness or rash).

Medicines – By state law, the teacher is prohibited from administering any medications. However, upon the written request of the legal guardian, a child may administer their own medication in the presence of the teacher. Any medication sent to school must have a note from you, the parent, explaining what the medication is, why it is being taken, and when the child should take it.

Transportation

There is a limited territory which is serviced through the use of South-Western City School District buses. Please contact our school for further information. Others will need to provide their own transportation to and from school.

Participation in Worship Services

The school children are scheduled to sing for various Sunday and Special Worship Services. You will be notified when your child's classroom is scheduled to sing. Since all the students of that class have prepared the song, all the children of that class are expected to attend the worship service. If ever your child is unable to be present, please let the teacher know well in advance of the scheduled date.

Weekly Chapel Service

Each Wednesday during the school year, all students will attend a short morning chapel service. **Parents are welcome and encouraged to attend when possible.** Weekly offerings will be taken and will be designated for our Synod's

missions – the specific mission area for each quarter of the school year will be made known in the school newsletter (*Hoofprints*).

Weather Related Cancellations

In the event of inclement weather, it may at times be necessary to delay the beginning of the school day or to cancel school for the day altogether. As a general rule, we will follow South-Western City School's policy for weather-related cancellations. If South-Western City Schools delay or close for the day, we will automatically follow. However, there may also be times that Beautiful Savior closes and South-Western City Schools do not. In order to make sure please check the following television and radio stations to confirm:

Dress Code

Beautiful Savior Lutheran School students are reminded, as Christians, that their bodies are the temples of the Holy Spirit. It is therefore appropriate that students come to school in clothes that are clean, neat, modest, and God-pleasing.

These four terms will be used as the basis for discussions with parents if there are questions about the clothes that the child is wearing to school. We are confident that Christian parents and Christian teachers can work out solutions to any disagreements that may occur because of the fads that are so typical of students in these grades. As styles change, specific items may be deemed

inappropriate for school. As a minimum, the following items are not acceptable:

- Beach shoes (flip flops)
- Jeans with holes, tears, or drags
- Any apparel which promotes gangs, secular rock bands, alcohol or tobacco, or inappropriate wording or pictures.
- Tight fitting clothes
- Halter-tops or tops with ‘spaghetti straps’
- Shorts shorter than 4-inches above the knee
- Pants with writing on the backside

Hairstyles must conform to the following guidelines:

- Hair must be neat and clean
- Hair may not extend below eyebrows or obstruct vision
- Males’ hair length cannot be beyond the collar.

Misc.:

- Boys may not wear any pierced jewelry or any kind of earrings.
- Girls may have pierced earlobes, but no more than two earrings per lobe.
- Pierced nose, eyebrows, lips, etc. are not permitted.
- Male students may not wear nail polish

Lockers

Of the students that are assigned lockers, anything that is displayed in or on the locker is subject to approval of their teacher. The lockers are the property of Beautiful Savior Lutheran School and can be searched anytime by the staff if deemed necessary. No open containers or candy, food or drink may be stored in the lockers (bag lunches are acceptable provided that the food is not in the locker for more than 48 hours).
